# CELEBRATING SOD'S LOVE YEARS OF SHARING GOD'S LOVE

June of 2021 saw Luther Manor begin to celebrate 60 years of sharing God's love! Since we laid the cornerstone of Luther Manor in 1960, our unwavering mission has been to share God's love by enriching the lives of older adults. Our journey began in the fall of 1956 when Rev. William B. Downey, pastor of Fox Point Lutheran Church,

appointed a committee to study the needs of the area's older adults and how to best meet them. The committee recommended building a 65-person care center to serve the aging population of the greater Milwaukee area. From this, the nonprofit, faith-based United Lutheran Program for the Aging (ULPA) was born with the mission to advocate for the needs of older adults of all faiths.

After years of planning, the ULPA purchased an expansive park-like setting in Wauwatosa and began construction on a 97-bed residential retirement community. Today, Luther Manor has grown to a

community of some 400 employees and 100 volunteers who help support the happiness and wellbeing of nearly 400 residents.

## AN ANNIVERSARY OF ANTIQUITY

#### **30 YEARS OF THRIFTY DEALS & FOUNDATIONAL SUPPORT**


The Den of Antiquity will be celebrating the venue's 30th Anniversary this fall. Sister Rose Kroeger, former Den Manager and the last Lutheran Deaconess residing at Luther Manor, identified an opportunity to help support residents that had outlived their financial resources. Originally donated items of clothing, household items and furniture were saved throughout the year. "Maxwell Street Days" sales were held in the HCC Activity Room and the former Chapel by a dedicated crew of volunteers a couple of times a year. All the proceeds from the sales were designated for the Luther Manor Foundation. Remaining items after the sale were donated to a resale shop owned by a group of Native Americans near the 6th Street Bridge.

Sister Rose gives credit to the good Lord above for giving her a dream/vision of a permanent resale store at Luther Manor that could be open year-round to raise funds for the Luther Manor Foundation. With the approval from Pastor William Truby, President/Executive Director, a space that was formerly used by Central Supply was the first location of the Den of Antiquity. Shelving

was purchased from a pharmacy located on 124th and Capitol Drive that was going out of business. Sister Rose had seen the title "Den of Antiquity" while cruising to the San Juan Islands. With administration approval, the "Den of Antiquity" opened on October 22, 1991. Soon the Den of Antiquity outgrew the initial space and the Den of Antiquity moved to its current location that was at one time used for therapy, a wheelchair cleaning/

repair shop and laundry/housekeeping storage. New display cabinets were built by Terrace volunteers in the wood shop. The Den Furniture room was recently added to house and display donated furniture for sale.

Recently re-opened after a pause due to COVID-19, the Den has been blessed with many hard-working volunteers throughout the years. Luther Manor volunteer Carol Coraggio remains as a Charter Volunteer of the Maxwell Street Days and the Den of Antiquity. The legacy of Sister Rose, faithful Den Volunteers, donors and customers continues to support the Luther Manor Foundation with proceeds nearing \$600k. According to Sister Rose, "The Lord has blessed this venture as a ministry."

### INDEPENDENT, YET SUPPORTED

#### A STORY OF SUPPORTED LIVING

"I remember waking up one morning and I noticed that I couldn't get my legs moving. It scared me. My next thought was, 'I don't want to leave my apartment." These are the words of 103 year old Luther Manor resident & supportive living participant, Marian Thielke, but her words just might echo your own or that of your loved one.

The goal of independent living is to stay as independent as long as possible. Sometimes, though, help is needed. For the last two years, Marian and her family have been very grateful for the help they have been provided through Luther Manor's Supportive Living program.

I'm taking a shower, or the extra help I need when the distance I need to travel is a little too long to walk. I've been here for 23 years and because of supportive living, I still get to do all the things I love to do and stay in the apartment I'm so comfortable in."

Marian recalls, "I called my son that morning and said to him, 'I think I need some extra help.' The next thing I knew, my apartment was filled with people who wanted to provide that help and let me know what options were available." After some thought and consideration, Marian and her family decided to sign up for the first level of supportive living help. "I was concerned about the cost of it, of course, but my son reminded me that it was affordable and that the value of the benefits would outweigh the expense of it. That has certainly been true."

Marian gets help showering, taking trips to Luther Manor's convenience store and beauty parlor, as well as arranging transportation when she has appointments outside of Luther Manor. "I really love the people that take care of me and look

has been a blessing. "We looked at other options, discussed the advantages and disadvantages of each, and came to the conclusion that this program was right for Marian. It's been a great way to manage her health and safety and for us to know that she's getting all the help she needs when we can't be there."

"I didn't want to be a burden on my kids," Marian said. "They have their own lives and live in various places, and it's not fair to expect so much of them when the help I need is right here whenever I need it!"




to once again resume their volunteer service as needed being open to changes, learning new protocols and volunteer positions.

When we held the inaugural meeting of our Creative Writing Club here in The Terrace back in early November, I wasn't sure what to expect. Would people want to participate? Would they come back after the first session? Would they show up at all? All of the fears and anxieties that one experiences when spearheading a new initiative were certainly looming large in my mind.

The idea of starting a Creative Writing Club wasn't entirely new to Luther Manor. Not that long ago, a similar club called the Terrace Creative Writing Group formed and helped write some of the many plays our residents put on each year. The recent resurgence of that idea was the result of a combination of reminiscing, resident feedback and staff suggestions. Once the seed was planted, the idea really began to take on a life of its own. Terrace Director, Kathi Brueggemann, was steadfast in her support, encouragement and, despite her very busy schedule, volunteered to help lead the club.

As of this writing, the Creative Writing Club has met once a month for the last 3 months. Every time we meet, I am truly amazed by what is shared. Sometimes we have prompts for those who wish to use them, but the vast majority of the writing that has been shared is free-form: beautiful poems, deeply personal stories and cherished memories of years gone by.

The benefits have been as numerous as they are self-evident. Each meeting we listen to each other with a keen ear and an open mind. It is through this process that we have forged

stronger relationships with each other, learned about people's unique and individual life experiences, seen things through fresh perspectives and worked through difficult and emotional subject matters. The therapeutic benefits of putting pen to paper and letting your thoughts and feelings flow from your mind into sentences and paragraphs have been well-known and well-documented for quite some time.

That being said, it so much different to experience it firsthand. I could say so much more, but I suppose I will conclude with the words of the great American author E.B. White:

"All writing is communication; creative writing is communication through revelation – it is the self – escaping into the open."

# SEWING & REAPING BLESSINGS

#### **HOSPICE VOLUNTEER MAKES BEARS & BLANKETS**

Two of the many things that Luther Manor depends upon are our volunteers and their creative ideas. So when Jennifer Oakes, Volunteer Coordinator for Luther Manor Hospice, got a call from Dianne, a local, 84-year-old who had expressed a desire to volunteer through her gift of sewing, she began brainstorming!

"Debby Boyd, our Hospice Director, has worked in hospice for over twenty years. She knew about other memory bear programs in other hospices and proposed we do something similar," said Jennifer. Memory bears are created to help comfort grieving loved ones by making a bear

his skin," Jane says touching the bear. "When I'm holding it, I'm close to him."

With memory bears still being freshly made, a new idea was hatched for Dianne to take

on: fidget blankets for dementia patients. Jennifer shared, "I remember a nursing student from Bryant Stratton college came and did a presentation for us on how critical fidget blankets are for stress reduction, nervous system regulation, and tactile stimulation for these patients. We knew we had to get that program going." Fidget blankets are lap-sized quilts with things

like thread bobbins, baby toys, and rattles securely fastened to it. Jennifer asked Dianne about it. "She said, 'You know me, Jen. I'm always up for

something new!' So she did some research on what fidget blankets were and how to best make them. They turned out so great!" Dianne added, "Making the bears and blankets gives me the opportunity to help others right from my home. It's an adventure to take someone's precious memory clothing and turn it into a bear they can love!"

Luther Manor's Hospice program is unique in that it offers many complementary therapy programs: things like music therapy, pet therapy, art therapy, aromatherapy, acupuncture, and reiki massage. Now, they offer memory bears and fidget blankets! Both of these new offerings were born of one person's desire to use their gifts and volunteer.

out of their loved one's favorite piece of clothing - whether that be a shirt, bow tie, or dress. "Dianne had begun sewing bears because she had lost people in her own life and found making the bears very comforting. Ultimately, she wanted to bring that same care and comfort to others who were grieving," Jennifer remarked. While the making of the bears is done voluntarily, donations are encouraged and a person can request as many bears made as they wish. "We've had one bear, three bears, and even twenty bears made for one person," said Jennifer. "Certain family members requested different pieces of clothing that meant something special to them." Resident Jane Chin lost her husband, Chuck, in June 2020 and has a memory bear. "This was on
