
GET TO KNOW YOUR NEIGHBOR Allan Prokop

Allan Prokop in I-204, moved into Luther Manor seven months ago. He and his wife, Diane, are "the happy wanderers." They move "side by side" through all their activities. They are a unique couple that enjoy each other's company all the time.

Allan was born in 1943 in Berwyn, Illinois. He was an only child. He grew up in Broadview, a suburb in Chicago, and played football for two years for East Proviso High School. Before the military draft called him, he volunteered to join

the Air Force base in Kincheloe, Michigan.



Coming home after four years of service, he enrolled in Community College and studied Accounting. His first job was working for the Motorola employees of the twenty-eight cafeterias and vending machines across the United States. He stayed with Motorola working in the employee stores of television and stereos with the population of 150,000 employees all over Florida, Texas, Iowa, and many more states. He made life-long friends. He met Diane at an alumni club dance in Des Plaines, Illinois. With a broad smile and a twinkle in his eye, he said,



"First time going and first dance, I picked her out of a large crowd." They married in 1970, presently fifty-two years dancing and still counting. Allan enjoyed watching his son playing intramural sports. In their free time, they enjoyed sightseeing in places of interest and touring down the highways and byways. Sadly today, Allan said, "Motorola employs only 13,000 employees," coast to coast. He had liked working for the service club banquets when they had well-known celebrities, such as Bob Hope. He worked at Motorola

in Schaumburg, Illinois for thirty years, from 1968-1998. Diane taught school thirteen years in Chicago and was a teaching assistant in Schaumburg for fifteen years.

He left Motorola when they were downsizing to accept a great offer to work for eight years as the Business Manager at Elk Grove Village, Illinois as the library personnel and accounting supervisor and the hiring of maintenance.

In 2006 after forty-two years, they retired at Del Webb Sun City Huntley, Illinois in a 55+ community. About ten years before, Diane happened to see a PBS program on TV talking about Luther Manor. 

I am Board Certified and have a Fellowship, a physician

who has advanced sub-specialty training in their field. It provides an added level of expertise, insight, and experience, which many patients find comforting. Besides Internal Medicine, I am a Fellow in Hospice and Palliative Care Medicine too. Palliative Care means people-centered health services relieving serious health-related suffering, be it physical, psychological, social, or spiritual, a global ethical responsibility. I also completed and maintained the Certified Medical Director Training Program in Hospice and Palliative Care.

I was born and brought up in Mysore, called Garden City, India. I came to the United States for higher studies after completing Medical School in India. I completed Medical Residency at Froedtert and the Medical College of Wisconsin in 2000.

Do you go to meetings?

Two meetings I attend are QAPI (Quality Assurance and Performance Improvement) and IDG (Interdisciplinary Group).

QAPI is an initiative undertaken by the Center for Medicare and Medicaid studies to expand improvement activities in nursing homes.

Phytonutients: COLOR YOUR PLATE FOR HEALTH

Phytonutrient or phytochemical are broad names for a wide variety of chemicals produced by plants. In plants, phytonutrients provide structure and color, aide in growth, inhibit the growth of competing plants, and aide in predator resistance. Researchers study phytonutrients for their potential health promoting properties, especially around cancer and heart



disease. Phytonutrients are found in fruits, vegetables, whole grains, nut, beans, herbs, tea, and coffee. Different plants contain different phytonutrients so eat a variety of colors. Enjoy the bounty of the summer produce season!

CAROTENOIDS

Give plants their yellow, orange and red color. They act as antioxidants in your body.

GLUCOSINOLATES

Found in cruciferous vegetables like brussels sprouts, cabbage, kale, and broccoli. They give these veggies their odor and flavor, and may help prevent the growth and development of cancer cells.

ELLAGIC ACID

Found in a number of berries, especially raspberries, strawberries, and pomegranates. It may help to fight cancer by slowing the growth of cancer cells.

RESVERATROL

Found in grapes, purple grape juice, and red wine. Research suggests it may play a role in reducing the risk of heart disease and certain cancers.

THE CARESMART IS NOW OPEN A unique benefit for our dedicated & essential staff

On June 7, 2023, employees who work at Luther Manor were given a new option for picking up last-minute food items for meals before they leave campus at the end of a shift.

CARESmart, a new convenience store in our Wauwatosa campus, carries products like milk, cereal, boxed pasta and other essentials - for free or at low-cost prices. Developed by the Luther Manor CARES Committee, the CARESmart concept follows the life plan community's core values of Compassion, Accountability, Respect, Everyone Matters and Service to God, and was influenced by a onetime donation given to workers during COVID-19.

"Our healthcare workers were essential during the pandemic," recalled Patrick Hansen, Luther Manor's Chief Resident Experience Officer.

"People couldn't get supplies and many staff leave work late at night because of our 24/7/365 operation. So, we put together a CARES bag for more than 300 staff containing toilet paper, paper towels, hand sanitizer, bleach and a treat. It was a 'thank you' to them for their amazing dedication and helped calm our routine."

Early this summer, we will be opening The Sanctuary, an outdoor space connected to our new memory care, The Gardens, offering residents solace, health, and social interaction surrounded by the wonder of God's creation!

Research shows that residents living with dementia benefit greatly from being cared for within a nature-centric setting. Sitting with family and friends at a bench, or walking along the pathways inside of a secure space will bring a sense of peace and stir the senses.

The Sanctuary will feature 88 shrubs, 95 perennials, and 6 trees for year-round color within a 5,200 square-foot area. We will also rebuild an existing pergola, creating a central hub for special events.

The Luther Manor Foundation is looking to raise \$96,874 to build it.

When a former CIO suggested offering this assistance on a more permanent basis, the CARESmart idea was born. In the past two years, Luther Manor has secured grants from The Green Bay Packers Foundation (\$5,500), Anon Charitable Trust, (\$5,000) and the Siebert Lutheran Foundation (\$43,000) to cover the gutting and renovation of a former pharmacy on campus, and operating costs to make CARESmart a reality.

"As we renovated, our next need was where can we get the products?" said Hansen. "A past board member suggested a partnership with Just One More Ministry (JOMM), a conglomerate that helps disperse groceries to organizations in the metro area. JOMM will provide 80% of our items for us to pick up on a weekly basis, things like macaroni and cheese or spaghetti sauce. We will supplement other necessary food items at a reduced cost."

Hansen says CARESmart is another employee benefit that can help attract and retain healthcare workers in what remains a tight job market.

"About 34% of our employees earn \$15 or less an hour. CARESmart helps supplement what they need. The store is not intended to replace their preferred supermarket for shopping. It's just an affordable and convenient option to grab a box of cereal or other staple for the family."

Current and future grants will allow Luther Manor to pay one part-time staff member to manage the CARESmart store and remain self-sustainable for the future.
